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Dr. Montoya is the Acting Director of the Division of Therapeutics and Medical Consequences (DTMC) of the National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA). He received an M.D. from the University of Antioquia (Colombia), a Masters in Public Health from The Johns Hopkins School of Public Health, and completed residency training in Psychiatry at the University of Antioquia and the University of Maryland Hospital (Baltimore). He has been Fulbright Fellow at The Johns Hopkins School of Public Health, Visiting Foreign Fellow at the Intramural Research Program of NIDA, Consultant for the Pan American Health Organization, and Director of the Practice Research Network of the American Psychiatric Association. He lead a large program of research at NIDA that focuses on advancing the development of psychosocial and pharmacological treatments for Substance Use and Addiction Disorders. He has published extensively in the areas of etiology, prevention, treatment (pharmacological and non-pharmacological), and medical consequences of drug abuse. He recently published a book summarizing the science on biologics (vaccines, monoclonal antibodies, and enzymes) to treat substance use disorders.
